who joined the Master. Many of the displays were interactive and liverymen and their guests enjoyed 'having a go'. What interested a number of us were the six colour coded reflection cards, which prompted participants to take a coloured ping-pong ball and drop it into a data collection display.

For the researchers among the liverymen, an interesting physical Likert Scale (five options often

used in surveys and questionnaires) had been used, but it was not showing the normal distribution. The 'bring it on' option was most popular with the middle option "mmm...not sure" the least popular. Lots to read into this, but when examining the coloured balls it was clear that those who had engaged felt that genome editing should not be used to create 'Super Humans' (count the light blue balls – 18+13) although 16 felt it was an important option. A great way of helping those new to research



consider the challenges ... a number count gives different outcomes to a percentage count, and how do we know everyone only voted once etc.
