## <u>Literacy Improvement Award 2022/3. Third year (of three)</u>

Bryan Marsh 'ring fenced' £2,000 of the £10,000 annual SJF, for Literacy Awards for three years. This year sees the final year of this funding, and these are details.

1.South-East Wales: Shannon Hawkins – Coleg y Cymoedd Recommendation from: Tanya Gordon (Skills for Further Study Coordinator) Coleg Y Cymoedd.

Tanya Gordon recommended Shannon Hawkins who struggled with her literacy skills due to un-diagnosed dyslexia. Since coming to the college, she has worked incredibly hard to improve both her literacy and numeracy skills. In 2022, she achieved the Level 2 Diploma in Skills for Further Study. Shannon has further developed her literacy skills within the Level 3 Skills for Further Study course. Her confidence has grown, and she has made huge strides in her English Language and Communication Skills. She has also worked very hard to improve her research skills, answering questions in class



and presenting information to her peers. As a result of this, her own language skills have improved greatly with the use of electronic reading and writing equipment. Her literacy skills will be further improved with continued support and appropriate learning equipment. Shannon will complete the Access Level 3 diploma in Healthcare to take up her place at university to study Midwifery in September 2023. Shannon really enjoyed her studies and continually motivated others; she is very much a team player. She has many qualities including being a conscientious and hardworking individual with a positive and determined attitude.

Shannon is a hardworking, caring, kind and dedicated student who deserves to be acknowledged for her hard work and commitment to self-improvement. The award will be used to enable Shannon to purchase relevant equipment for her studies, such as a surface pro, that she can use to write on and use the phonic and dictate applications. 2. South-West Wales: Shawna John – Pembroke College Recommendation from: Lucy Murdoch, Interim Curriculum Area Manager for Skills, Former Section Lead: English Pembrokeshire College.



Shawna joined Pembrokeshire College in 2019 on the Level 2 Health and Social care programme. She was also enrolled on a GCSE English resit programme. Shawna is dyslexic. Despite great effort and determination, Shawna did not achieve her C grade during that academic year. This prevented Shawna from progressing onto Level 3 and although this knocked her confidence it did not deter her from trying and re-engaging with her English studies.

Shawna proceeded to enrol on the Level 2 Skills for Further study programme and again attempted her GCSE English and successfully achieved a C grade. During this year she attended additional English support sessions outside of her timetabled sessions and worked with the Specialist Support Assessor. This resulted in her being awarded a reader pen to assist her in class and during exams. Shawna's English lecturer nominated Shawna for a Pembrokeshire College's Skills' Award where she was recognised for her hard work and commitment to her English studies.

Shawna is now studying Level 3 Health and Social Care and is in the process of securing employment in the NHS as a Health Care worker. The WLCoW award is of huge benefit - helping her with her ultimate goal to undertake a nursing degree. She will use the Award for IT resources and books for her level 3 course.

Shawna was presented with her award by the Pembroke College Principal. She wanted me to pass on "Thank for you this award. At the end of the academic year I am looking to gain employment in the NHS and to continue you my studies to further progress. This award will be a huge support in achieving this goal. Thank you"

Katryna is undertaking an Agored Cymru Level 2 Diploma in Skills for Further Study – the focus of the course is to develop Katryna's proficiency in a range of different skills which include writing, research, presentations, ICT, Welsh Culture and Sustainability:

She submits assignments within the required time and is thorough in her assignment content. Katryna does a lot of research before she hands in her assignment, and this is evident in the final draft.
